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# MAY 22 GENERAL MEETING

## Storms, Satellites, and Shotguns: Migratory Connections and Perils for Shorebirds Along the Atlantic Flyway

At our next General Meeting, Mike Wilson will be discussing the shorebirds



that concentrate in large numbers in coastal Virginia during migration. For some species, these stopover areas support the bulk of their arctic breeding populations. Over the past 20-30 years a large portion of shorebird populations migrating along the Atlantic Flyway have declined and are of high conservation concern. Recent advances in satellite telemetry have provided new insights into migration patterns and the perils they face while making these incredible jouneys. Recently, a pair of Whimbrels being tracked using satellite were shot by hunters in the Caribbean. The fate of these birds has altered perspectives on the threat that hunting poses to their conservation.

Mike Wilson is a research biologist with the Center for Conservation Biology where he works on the ecology and conservation of birds across a wide variety of ecosystems such as forests and wetlands. Mike's career and research have been the conduits for his abiding interest in the ecology and conservation of biological communities and populations. Mike has directed research projects to develop an understanding of the social and biological factors that limit bird populations that, in turn, are used to produce management guidelines for declining species. He works across an array of ecosystems that support bird species dependent upon barrier islands, grasslands, forests, and marshes. Specific projects have included the impacts of silviculture on forest birds, patch size on grassland birds, and sea-level rise on marshbirds. Mike also coordinates the Nightjar Survey Network; a citizenscience project designed to gather national-level data on population trends of these species. Mike has a B.S. in Biology at Indiana University of Pennsylvania and an M.A. in Biology, College of William and Mary. (Meeting details on page 8.)

# PADDLE SEASON IS OFF TO A GREAT START



As of this writing, April 15, the 2014 paddle season is proceeding very nicely. We have missed only two days when the weather was bad. Those days came just at the right moment because water levels were dropping dramatically and the rains helped raise the water level.

To date, we have escorted almost 90 people down the river and most days the weather has been very kind to us. The vegetation is slowly emerging - much earlier than last year's very slow start - and we are beginning to see spatterdock blooms appearing and needles bursting forth on the bald cypress trees.

As always, the Yellow-throated Warblers were the first migrants to arrive. Those beautiful little Prothonotary Warblers arrived about four days ago and are already investigating the nesting boxes Gary Driscole has erected on various sections of the river. We are also have seen and heard many White-eyed Vireos, Common Yellowthroats, Red-winged Blackbirds and Ovenbirds all along the waterway.

The big news is the return of the Bald Eagles! Last year half of the nest which they had used every year since 2002 blew down. We occasionally saw them in the area but they made no attempt to rebuild the nest. We were afraid they were gone forever. But this year, there they were with the nest repaired and both birds busy with nesting activities. She was on the nest and he was standing guard in the nearby trees or bringing food. We will be watching closely in the days to come for a glimpse of the young.

Our crew members did a great deal of clearing on the river in preparation for the trips. Surprisingly, in spite of the severe winter, there were almost no new blow-downs that obstructed the route. A lot of tricky places that gave us trouble last year were cleared out and a lot of brush overhanging the channel was cleared back. Consequently, the trips have been much easier this year, especially for inexperienced paddlers.

Response from FODR members to help with the planned nesting bird foray conducted by the Virginia Society of Ornithology (VSO) June 7 through 15 has been rewarding. We have volunteers to accompany foray participants on five of our FODR tracts and property monitors have agreed to prepare the trails for easy access to good nesting areas.

Almost all the property on Dragon Run is privately owned and lined with deep swamps which makes it exceeding difficult to reach the shoreline, a habitat surveyors are anxious to census. VSO organizers of the event are especially pleased that we will provide access. and assistance as our lands are about the only way they can survey birding activity along the river. A report of foray results will be made available to us at the conclusion of the event.

Did you know that the Dragon Run played a part in American history on several occasions.? During Bacon's Rebellion in 1676, the Pamunkey Indians took refuge in the Dragon after being driven from their main town. The highway marker (right) commemorates this event.

The marker is located on Farley Park Road (Rt. 603) in King and Queen County across the bridge from where FODR paddle trips end.

The GPS coordinates are 37.633589, -76.696334.

# General Meeting of Friends of Dragon Run, February 26, 2014

President Davis Rhodes opened the meeting and after taking care of General business Teta Kain introduced the night's guest speaker.

Attendees at the meeting were then transported from the Dragon Run to out of this universe. The presentation of guest speaker Mark Adams took us into the realm of radio astronomy. Mark is a professional astronomer with the National Radio Observatory (NRAO) headquartered in Charlottesville, Virginia. He has extensive experience in the defense industry, astronomy, and has even written a book on birding.

Various radio telescopes in West Virginia, New Mexico, Hawaii, and even the highest, located in the Atacama Desert in Chile at 16,500 feet were discussed. Discussion was supplemented with spectacular photos. These telescopes collect radio waves, not light, from pulsars, emissions from stars and galaxies, and even radio waves from complex molecules that could be the precursors of life. With present knowledge and theory Mark was able to explain Black Holes in lay terminology.
